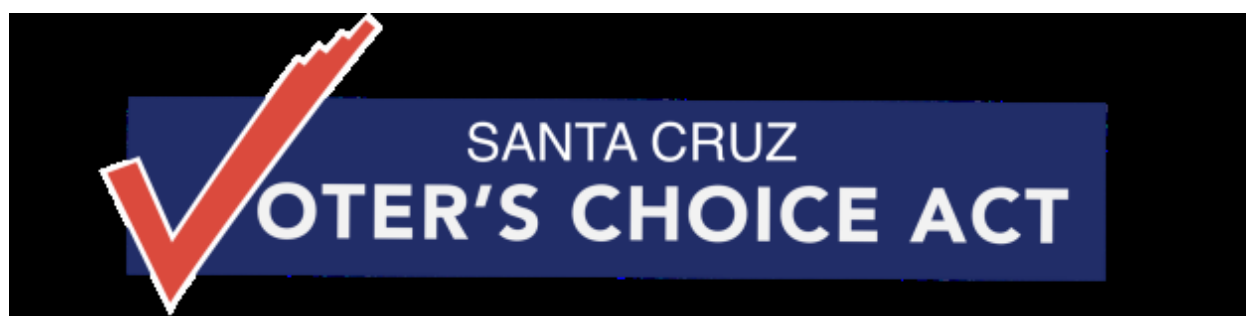

Executive Summary

Santa Cruz County fully implemented the Voters Choice Act with the June 7, 2022 Statewide Primary Election.

Because of the shortened time for public discussion from when the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors approved the county's transition to a vote center model on March 22, 2022 and the adopted Election Administration Plan (EAP) on May 25, 2022, the Santa Cruz County Clerk/Elections Department decided to keep all methods of public input available through the summer and create a supplemental document to be used in conjunction with the adopted EAP. This document is the result of the comments that were received and observations from the County Clerk/Elections staff from the June 7, 2022, election.

Unfortunately, illness again affected the Department from mid-July to mid-September often causing up to half the staff to be absent each day. With redistricting, preparation for the November election (candidate filing, ballot creation, voter guide preparation) staff were needed to complete those projects and the anticipated public meetings to discuss the supplemental document did not occur.

Because of that, public comment opportunities were provided through October 1, 2022 for people to comment on the June election, the Vote Center Model, the Adopted EAP, and more. Santa Cruz County received many phone calls on the comment line and several emails to the comment email that were not germane to the EAP. Only the comments made during the public hearings and afterwards that had to do with the EAP, vote centers and Santa Cruz County elections were considered in this document.

The Supplemental Document will work alongside the Adopted EAP and will provide further information and clarification. The Adopted EAP cannot be amended until after the November 2022 election pursuant to Elections Code 40059(H)(i) so changes listed in this Supplemental Document along with any other changes, clarifications and refinements will be made in 2023 following the process set out in the Elections Code.

Vote by Mail Ballots (page 6 of the Adopted EAP)

Over the past 5 years, voter behavior has shifted to return vote by mail ballots closer and closer

to Election Day. However, in the June 2022 election, voters waited until Election Day to return the ballots. The voting locations and drop boxes were very busy with returns and many voters mailed their ballots via the United States Postal Service (USPS).

The Elections Code allows for ballots that are postmarked on or before Election Day and received by the County Clerk/Elections Department to be considered timely. However, Santa Cruz County does not postmark mail at the main post office. Instead, all Santa Cruz County mail is trucked over to San Jose where it is postmarked. This can delay a postmark of one day or more for any mail depending on when that mailbox is picked up by USPS. Many voters are unaware of the USPS process/procedure in Santa Cruz County, and it caused many ballots to be challenged ballots because they were postmarked after Election Day even though the envelopes were deposited into mailboxes on June 7.

Our voting instructions, in various locations, recommend that voters not mail their ballots less than a week before an election. The Department recommends that a voter instead use a drop box or drop off location. If that is not possible, then a voter should go into a US Post Office and have the return envelope hand cancelled by a postal clerk to ensure a timely postmark.

For the November 8, 2022, election there will be a mailing specific to getting a postmark on the return envelope, along with a letter to the Editor, a press release, and a social media campaign.

Vote Center and Ballot Drop Box Locations

Vote Center Locations

One concern that was noted during the public input period in April/May 2022 was using the Community Room that is part of the Santa Cruz County Sheriff Complex. This location was chosen because the Simpkins Swim Center is under construction and would not be usable for the 2022 elections. Locations in this area were surveyed and looking at all the requirements in Elections Code 4005(a)(10)(b), the Santa Cruz County Voting Location Accessibility Plan that was approved by the California Department of Justice in early 2000 and is still being used, and other location citing tools, the Community Room was not only the most accessible location, but also the most accessible location available for 11 days of voting. Arrangements were made to minimize the amount of Sheriff "presence" in the building where the Community Room is located. Construction on Simpkins Swim Center should complete by the end of 2022 and will be the voting location for all future elections.

There will be two location changes for the November election. The Santa Cruz County Fairgrounds was not available for the June election, so Lakeview Middle School, which was not in session, was used. The room used at the school is used for classes, causing 3 days students would be displaced therefore not making the school an option for November. In downtown Santa Cruz, voting locations are regularly used at Depot Park and Kaiser Arena. Neither location was available for both June and November, so Kaiser Arena was used in June and Depot Park will be used in November. Both of these locations are 4-day locations and signage will be

posted to provide notification. Both changes are also noted in the voting instructions and the voting location postings.

Comments made by voters in our more rural areas about not having a voting location were also noted. These comments did not come during the public input period but were voiced after the June election. Working with our County Information Services Department (ISD), AT&T and Verizon, we were able to locate areas in Davenport and Loma Prieta where we could have “pop-up” Election Day vote centers. Previously we had the VoteMobile in these areas for 6 hours, but there was an accident on Highway 1 (the only way to get to Davenport) on June 7, and we were unable to get the VoteMobile in place. By utilizing “pop-ups” we will be able to provide a better voting experience for these voters and free up the VoteMobile to respond to other areas needing assistance.

Drop Box Locations

There were no additional drop boxes installed between June and November, so there remains 17 permanent 24/7 drop boxes, 6 drop off locations, and drop off locations at senior living facilities (for resident use only – not open to public). All drop boxes and drop off locations were available for 29 days.

Voting Security

(page 26 of the Adopted EAP)

The County Clerk/Elections office aggressively pursues security measures to protect the integrity of our elections by paying attention to issues related to ballot integrity and voter registration systems. Although threats are constantly changing and incidents are unique, there are best practices and strict protocols in place to prepare for threats and incidents.

The County Clerk/Elections office continues to improve our current systems through hardware and software lifecycle management practices. The Registrar's office has implemented physical and cybersecurity controls while incorporating training for employees.

There are strict access controls in place securing the room where the voting system resides. The County Clerk/Elections office has ceiling mounted cameras in all rooms where the ballots are processed and tabulated. The cameras are also directed at entry and exit areas for additional security precautions.

Safety and Security of Election Staff

The County Clerk/Elections Department takes the safety and security of staff very seriously in the current climate surrounding elections. The Department has trained staff at all voting locations on the election process, security protocol, as well as de-escalation techniques. The Department has worked with the groups that are planning on observing in the voting locations

what observer protocol is, and at the County Clerk/Elections office, there have been areas set up where observers can stand to view the various activities and monitors have been placed in the hallway so observers can watch the tabulation and adjudication process.

The Department will be deploying lights to the exterior drop boxes for the Election Night 8pm pickups along with security if requested by the drop box retrieval teams. We will also have lights and security in the parking lot of the main office to assist with receiving of the voted ballots from the Vote Centers. Security will be provided by the alarm company that the County employs and will not be armed law enforcement.

De-escalation techniques along with observer training has been emphasized in poll worker training and for staff working at the County Clerk/Elections office. The Department has also coordinated with the County Safety Officer and local law enforcement to alert them to where the voting and drop box locations along with the dates and hours of operation for their awareness and there will be periodic visits for safety purposes.

Additional Outreach Specific to November 2022 Election

The June 2022 election exhibited a new voter behavior of mailing ballot envelopes on Election Day. Outreach will be directed to all voters to remind them of their return options including dropping off at a vote center, any drop box or drop off location, other county if out of town, postmark codes, and the mail process.

This outreach will use a combination of medias including a direct mailing, media releases, social media, handouts for our partners like Grey Bears and the Second Harvest Food Bank, as well as send electronic bulletins to include in newsletters for organizations.

Santa Cruz County Clerk/Elections Department has joined with other counties in the Bay Area to create "The Bay Area Coalition" to provide common messaging across the Bay Area counties regarding education on the various facets of an election. The Coalition has created press releases, media campaigns, videos, flyers and more that speak to elections and can be used in all counties and across all media streams. This has been beneficial to Santa Cruz County because we are in a shared media location where our news stations all are located outside of Santa Cruz County. By coming up with shared media, voters are getting a common message instead of hearing about the process in a neighboring county and assuming it is the same in Santa Cruz County. A common message about the "basics" allows for Santa Cruz County to enhance the message rather than have to figure out how to convince these out of county media outlets to focus on something they do not experience in their home county.
